CareSouth Carolina is now offering COVID-19 Bivalent Booster Doses for children ages 5 –11



CareSouth Carolina is offering the COVID-19
Pfizer Bivalent Booster for children ages 5 to
11 at its Hartsville Pediatric and Bennettsville
Pediatric sites only. The Pfizer booster is available
to children 12 and older at the Hartsville site
only, while the Moderna booster continues to be
available to those who are at least 18 years old
at the Bishopville, Chesterfield, McColl and Latta
sites only.

These new boosters are called "bivalent" and provide protection against two different COVID-19 strains: the original and the highly contagious omicron variant. The single-shot bivalent boosters may be administered at least two months following the primary vaccination or booster.

Carolina has Immunizations Aeeailable to Defend Aoainst the Flu



Flu season is here and healthcare officials are recommending getting the vaccine as soon as possible. "The best defense against the flu is the vaccine," said CareSouth Carolina Chief of Nursing Tracie Thigpen. "And the best time to get the vaccine is now. We have already had cases reported in South Carolina."

The flu is a contagious respiratory illness caused by the influenza virus and can be transmitted through close contact with an infected person. Symptoms may include a sudden onset of fever, cough, headache or muscle aches, tiredness, sore throat and nasal congestion. The flu can cause serious infections like pneumonia.

The Centers for Disease Control (CDC) recommends that everyone 6 months and older get a flu vaccine every season because it can reduce flu illnesses, doctors' visits, hospitalizations and has been shown to be life-saving.

Thigpen also advises those 65 and older get the high-dose vaccine that CareSouth Carolina offers.
