# CSC's Community Outreach Team named ommunity Health Worker Group of the Yea



CareSouth Carolina's community outreach team was named the 'Community Health Worker Group of the Year' by the South Carolina Community Health Worker Association.

CareSouth Carolina community health workers (CHWs) provide health education, assist in case management, address social needs and provide many more needed services in five counties throughout the Pee Dee region.

"I am so proud of our CHW program and the difference they make in our communities, for our patients," CareSouth Carolina CEO Ann Lewis said. "Health care is not always clinical and CHWs are vital to insuring that the whole picture of the individual is known – addressing everything from food insecurity and housing to transportation and access. CHWs are a vital part of the mission of CareSouth Carolina - enhancing and improving the health AND WELL BEING for everyone."

The team provides one-on-one case management and assistance in addressing social needs of everything from signing up for an insurance plan like Medicaid and the Affordable Care Act to assisting with connecting patients to needed services and resources. They also provide health education related to disease prevention, screenings, and healthy behaviors. Examples of health education topics include:

- Chronic disease prevention
- Nutrition
- Physical activity
- Smoking cessation
- **Transportation Services**
- Translation/Interpretation services

## CareSouth Celebrates Hispanic Heritage Month

CareSouth Carolina is celebrating Hispanic Heritage Month that takes place September 15 to October 15 every year as a time to recognize and celebrate the many contributions, diverse cultures, and extensive histories of the American Latino community. As of July 1, 2018, the Hispanic population of the United States was 59.9 million people, making people of Hispanic origin the nation's largest ethnic or racial minority (18.3% of the total U.S. population).

Answer: September 15 is the anniversary of independence for Costa Rica, El Salvador, Guatemala, Honduras, and Nicaragua. Mexico's independence day comes just one day later on September 16th, and Chile's falls on September 18th.

On September 15, 2021, SC Governor Henry McMaster signed a proclamation recognizing Hispanic Heritage Month.

## CareSouth Carolina Administering Pfizer IOVID–19 vaccine Booster Shot



CareSouth Carolina is administering the Pfizer COVID-19 Vaccine booster shot at our office locations.

To receive the Pfizer COVID-19 booster shot, you must have been fully vaccinated for at least six months with the Pfizer vaccine only. If you received the Moderna or Johnson & Johnson vaccine, you are not eligible for the Pfizer booster shot.

The recommendations for those individuals who should receive the booster are as follows:

- 65+ years of age.
- Long-term care residents
- 50-64 years of age with underlying conditions 18-49 years of age with underlying conditions are recommended to weigh their individual benefit risks
- Those who work in high-exposure occupations

Here's a few myths vs. facts about Breast Cancer (According to the National Cancer Institute):

- MYTH: If I don't have a family history of breast cancer, I won't get it.
- **FACT:** Many people diagnosed with breast cancer have no known family history.

**MYTH:** If you maintain a healthy weight, exercise regularly, eat healthy, and limit alcohol, you don't have to worry about breast cancer.

- **FACT**: Although these behaviors can help lower breast cancer risk, they can't eliminate it.
- **MYTH:** Breast cancer always causes a lump you can feel.
- **FACT:** Breast cancer might not cause a lump, especially when it first develops.
- **MYTH:** Wearing a bra, using underarm antiperspirant, carrying your cellphone in your bra or consuming too much sugar can cause breast cancer.

• **FACT:** There is no significant evidence of a connection between these things and breast cancer, but they are all still being studied.

## Get Your Flu Shot: Know The Facts

CareSouth Carolina is now administering the Flu Vaccine in our office locations.

The Facts About Flu Shots (According to the CDC):

• Flu vaccines are safe. Hundreds of millions of flu vaccines have been safely given to Americans for more than 50 years.

• Vaccination helps protect women during and after pregnancy. Flu vaccination during pregnancy also helps protects babies from flu for the first several months after birth when they are too young to be vaccinated.

• Flu vaccination can lower the risk of serious outcomes from heart disease and diabetes.

• Getting vaccinated yourself may also protect people around you, including those who are more vulnerable to serious flu illness.

• While some people who get vaccinated do still get sick, there is a growing amount of data showing that vaccination makes illness less severe, helping to prevent serious outcomes.

Flu vaccines cause antibodies to develop in the body about two weeks after vaccination. These antibodies provide protection against infection with the viruses that are used to make the vaccine.

The CDC recommends anyone 6 months or older receive the Flu vaccine.

### CareSouth Carolina presented with HRSA Badges of Recognition

CareSouth Carolina was presented with three nationallyacclaimed Uniform Data System (UDS) badges by the Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA).

CareSouth Carolina earned the 'Advancing Health Information Technology (HIT) for Quality' badge; Patient Centered Medical Home Recognition (PCMH); and the COVID-19 testing badge.

The Advancing Health Information Technology badge recognizes health centers that meet all criteria to optimize HIT services that advance telehealth, patient engagement, interoperability, and collection of social determinants of health to increase access to care and advance quality of care.

The Patient Centered Medical Home Recognition is for health centers with PCMH recognition in one or more delivery sites.

The COVID-19 testing badge recognizes health centers that tested more than 50% of their 2020 reported UDS patient populations from April 10, 2020 to July 2, 2021 and have a response rate of at least 50% to the weekly Health Center COVID-19 Survey.
