CareSouth Carolina Launches Enhanced Remote Patient Monitoring Program



CareSouth Carolina announces the launch of its enhanced Remote Patient Monitoring (RPM) program within the Value-Based Care Division.

Following the successful completion of a three-year pilot program in December 2023, which saw significant improvements in patient care and clinical workflows, CareSouth Carolina is excited to introduce a more integrated and effective solution.

During the initial program, the RPM team distributed devices, provided patient education, and retrained clinical staff to improve office workflows. The culmination of these efforts has paved the way for the new iteration of the program, which began on June 3, 2024. This new phase features improved integration between monitoring devices and the electronic medical record system, eClinicalWorks, enhancing the efficiency and effectiveness of patient care

In just the first week of the new program, the RPM team successfully recruited and enrolled 50 Medicare patients into the Hypertension RPM program.

The team focuses on key areas such as patient engagement, medication adherence, clinical team integration, and the adoption of evidence-based practices to improve patient outcomes. Currently, the program is enrolling Medicare patients with out-of-range blood pressures, with plans to expand to other patient populations in the future.

Tyneshia Cannon, RN, RPM Team Lead, expressed her enthusiasm for the program's potential impact: "Our goal as a Community Health Center is to educate our patients on the importance of understanding their blood pressure, the impact on their health and lifestyle, and medication adherence to yield the best results in lowering their blood pressure."

The RPM program aims to provide patients with the tools and knowledge they need to manage their blood pressure effectively. By leveraging technology and personalized care, CareSouth Carolina is committed to enhancing patient health outcomes and quality of life.

The commendation lauded Dr. Smith for his tireless dedication to championing the science of addiction medicine, treating the disease of addiction medically, serving vulnerable citizens of South Carolina, and saving lives and families.

Dr. Smith's remarkable contributions span decades, during which he has served both as a dedicated practitioner at CareSouth Carolina's Rosa Lee Gerald office in Society Hill and as the Chief Medical Officer. His commitment to addressing addiction as a medical issue has been instrumental in transforming lives across the state.

"I am very thankful to receive the award," Dr. Smith said. "It was fun to meet the Governor, but most thankful that the program has been able to help so many patients and their families."

Daniel Myers, MAT/SUD Program Director at CareSouth Carolina, highlighted Dr. Smith's pioneering efforts, stating, "Dr. Smith started treating patients when there was no funding to do it. He did it because he saw a great need. During the time he started he was the only provider at CSC offering MAT services. It was also at a time when MAT services were not popular among most providers. He was able to form a partnership with our local drug and alcohol agencies. This enabled some funding for high-risk patients who would have never been able to afford these services. He definitely pioneered the now successful and nationally recognized MAT/SUD program. His mentoring and training with providers within CSC led to CSC having one of the largest MAT healthcare provider participation programs in the entire state and the nation. This award was due to be given pre-covid but was postponed due to the pandemic. It is much deserved."

CareSouth Carolina's MAT Program operates with a mission to reduce morbidity, mortality, and harm associated with opioid misuse and overdose by providing immediate access to prevention, treatment, and sustained recovery services. MAT programs offer a safe and controlled level of medication to overcome opioid addiction, complemented by counseling and behavioral therapies. The ultimate goal of MAT is full recovery, including the ability to live a self-directed life. MAT has been clinically proven to improve patient survival, increase treatment retention, decrease illicit opiate use and other criminal activity among individuals with substance
