## CareSouth Carolina's Jaquetta Graham Honored as First-Ever Community Health Worker Award Recipient

CareSouth Carolina proudly announces that Jaquetta Graham, Family Support Services (FSS) Program Coordinator, has been selected as the inaugural recipient of the Community Health Worker Award presented by the Foundation For Community Impact and Health Equity. The award was presented during a recent gala recognizing individuals who demonstrate exceptional leadership, dedication, and service within their communities.

Graham's recognition marks a historic milestone, as she becomes the first recipient of this award, which celebrates the vital role community health workers play in bridging gaps in care and connecting individuals to essential resources.

Graham has been a dedicated member of the CareSouth Carolina team for nine years, steadily growing her impact across multiple roles. She began her journey as a patient advocate before advancing to Community Health Worker (CHW), then Outreach Specialist and Technical Advisor, and now serves as FSS Program Coordinator. Throughout her career, she has remained focused on one core mission: being a voice for the community.

"It's a lot of work, but it's meaningful work," said Graham. "I've been the voice for the community, helping deliver resources and making sure people get what they need."

Graham played a key role in operating the community hub through CareSouth Carolina's partnership with the Foundation For Community Impact and Health Equity. Through this initiative, she worked directly with patients and families to identify their needs and connect them with critical services—ranging from healthcare access to housing, employment assistance, and education support.

Her work goes far beyond traditional healthcare. Graham and her team assist individuals with SNAP applications, Medicaid application, medication applications, GED and college applications, disability application, daycare vouchers, and even basic necessities such as food and diapers.

"We are the face and voice for the community," Graham explained. "We don't just help with medical care—we help with anything that impacts a person's well-being. That could be housing, jobs, education, or family needs. There's a lot we do."

Outside of her professional work, Graham remains deeply involved in her community. She enjoys traveling, participating in church activities, mentoring youth, and serving families in various capacities. She also works as a Funeral Director Apprentice, continuing her commitment to supporting others during some of life's most difficult moments.

## CareSouth Carolina Breaks Ground on Bennettsville Clinic Expansion

CareSouth Carolina officially broke ground on Friday, March 20, on a major renovation and expansion project at its Bennettsville clinic, marking a significant investment in improving access to healthcare services for the Marlboro County community.

The project will nearly double the size of the existing Bennettsville Clinic at 999 Cheraw Street, expanding the facility to approximately 9,940 square feet. The renovation will allow CareSouth Carolina to enhance patient care while bringing several services together under one roof for the first time.

A key feature of the expansion will be a larger pharmacy with new drive-through access, a service that has been frequently requested by patients in the Bennettsville area. The redesigned space will also allow CareSouth Carolina to relocate women's health and pediatric services—which are currently offered at separate locations—into the expanded Bennettsville clinic.

By consolidating these services, patients and families will be able to access primary care, pediatric care, women's health services, pharmacy services, and much more, all at a single location, creating a more convenient and coordinated healthcare experience.

"CareSouth Carolina is pleased to begin renovations that will significantly improve patient access in Bennettsville," said Ann Lewis, CEO of CareSouth Carolina. "This project will bring our medical, pediatric, women's health, and pharmacy services together under one roof, creating a more coordinated and convenient experience for the patients and families we serve." Lewis said the redesigned facility will benefit both patients and healthcare providers by improving the flow of care and allowing clinical teams to collaborate more efficiently.

"The expanded and redesigned space will improve workflow for both patients and staff, allowing our care teams to collaborate more effectively while enhancing the overall patient experience," Lewis said. "These improvements reflect our continued commitment to strengthening access to high-quality healthcare in the Bennettsville community."

The project is partially funded through the Fiscal Year 2023 Capital Assistance for Hurricane Response and Recovery Efforts grant provided by the Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA) within the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services. The funding supports healthcare infrastructure improvements designed to strengthen community resilience and expand access to essential services.

Once completed, the expanded clinic will offer improved patient flow, additional space for clinical services, and enhanced convenience for families seeking care in the Bennettsville area. The addition of the drive-through pharmacy is expected to significantly improve medication access for patients who may face transportation or mobility challenges.

The groundbreaking ceremony on Friday brought together CareSouth Carolina leadership, community partners, and local supporters to celebrate the start of construction and the continued growth of healthcare services in Marlboro County. “This renovation represents another step in CareSouth Carolina’s long-term commitment to expanding access to care across the Pee Dee region,” Lewis said.

The project will allow CareSouth Carolina to better meet the growing healthcare needs of the Bennettsville community while continuing its mission of providing high-quality, affordable care to patients throughout northeastern South Carolina.

Board of Visitors, Pee Dee Area Health Education Consortium, Darlington County Communities in Schools, the Pee Dee Alzheimer’s Association, and many more.

Lewis’s leadership legacy spans more than four decades. She joined CareSouth Carolina in the early 1980s and has guided the organization through periods of growth, financial uncertainty, natural disasters, and a global pandemic, all while remaining focused on the organization’s mission to enhance the health and well-being of everyone it serves.

In addition to her current role, Lewis has been recognized nationally for excellence in community health leadership. In 2012, she received the John Gilbert Award from the National Association of Community Health Centers, one of the organization’s highest honors for leadership and service in community health.

Lewis just recently celebrated 45 years with CareSouth Carolina. She expressed no interest in slowing down and continues to lead with great vision and heart.

“It is an honor and a privilege that God has given me every single day,” Lewis shared. “I love CareSouth Carolina, and I love our communities. Let’s keep doing it.”

## CareSouth Carolina Providers Attend SC Nurse Legislative Day to Advocate for Healthcare Workers and Patient Access

Three of CareSouth Carolina’s dedicated healthcare providers recently represented the organization at South Carolina Nurse Legislative Day at the State House in Columbia.

Barbara Wright, FNP-C, Joe Reynolds, AGNP-C, and Jimmi Jones, FNP-BC attended the event on Thursday, February 26, joining hundreds of nurses and healthcare professionals from across the state. The annual gathering provides an opportunity for nurses to meet with lawmakers, discuss healthcare priorities, and advocate for policies that support both healthcare workers and the patients they serve.

This year’s legislative focus centered on two key issues affecting the healthcare community in South Carolina.

The first involves strengthening protections against workplace violence directed at healthcare workers, a growing concern across hospitals, clinics, and healthcare facilities nationwide. The second focuses on expanding the scope of practice for Advanced Practice Registered Nurses (APRNs), allowing them to provide more services independently and increasing access to care for patients, particularly in rural and underserved communities.

Wright, Reynolds, and Jones serve patients at CareSouth Carolina’s Rosa Lee Gerald Center in Society Hill, where they play an important role in delivering primary care and improving health outcomes for individuals and families throughout the region. All three providers are nurse practitioners at the location.

WALK-INS ARE WELCOME - APPOINTMENTS ARE ENCOURAGED

For a long time, traditional clinic hours worked for some patients, but for many others, they created real challenges. Work schedules, school, childcare, and transportation can all make it difficult to fit in an appointment during the standard 8-to-5 window.

CareSouth Carolina has responded to this in a way that feels both practical and necessary.

By expanding hours at multiple locations—including evenings and weekends—the organization is making it easier for patients to access care without having to put the rest of their lives on hold.

### Expanded Hours Across the Pee Dee

CareSouth Carolina has rolled out updated schedules across several locations, giving patients more opportunities to be seen at times that better fit their routines.



Here’s a breakdown of CareSouth Carolina’s expanded hours:

- Bishopville: Open until 8 p.m. on Tuesdays
- Cheraw: Open until 8 p.m. on Wednesdays
- Bennettsville: Open until 8 p.m. on Thursdays

In addition to evening hours, several locations are now offering Saturday clinics:

- Hartsville: Saturday clinic from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m.
- Hartsville Pharmacy is also open during these hours for added convenience
- Chesterfield: Saturday clinic from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m.
- Dillon: Saturday clinic from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m.

These changes may seem simple, but they open the door for patients who previously struggled to find time for appointments during the week.

### A More Practical Approach to Patient Care

When appointments are easier to schedule, patients are more likely to follow through with routine visits, manage ongoing conditions, and address concerns before they become more serious.

Evening hours mean fewer patients have to leave work early or miss out on income just to be seen. Weekend clinics offer a solution for families balancing school schedules and busy weekdays. And in places like Hartsville, the ability to visit a provider and pick up prescriptions in the same trip adds another layer of convenience.

For many patients, these changes remove barriers that have existed for years.
