CSC Community Pharmacy Opens New Hartsville Location

The CSC Community Pharmacy, previously located in the Hartsville Medical Center, has moved to its new building - a standalone pharmacy - right next door to the Medical Center.

The CSC Community Pharmacy, located at 1280 South Fourth Street, is a fullservice pharmacy that looks to provide excellent care through consultation and affordable prices on prescriptions.

The community pharmacy takes all major insurances and is open to all, even those who are not patients of CareSouth Carolina. The Hartsville pharmacy also has a drive-thru to make things more convenient for patients getting their medications filled.

Ashley Singleton, chief of pharmacy at CareSouth Carolina, said the standalone building will be an added benefit and convenience to the patients.

"This will provide another avenue of service for the patients," Singleton said. "Those who have had difficulties coming into the medical center in the past will be able to stay in their car, drop-off their medication and pick it up all with ease. Though many think because we're located on the CareSouth Carolina campus that we're only open to CSC patients, we're open to everyone. There is additional parking that wasn't available before and we designed this building with avenue of access and convenience in mind for the patient."

The CSC Community Pharmacy and drive-thru is open from 8:30 a.m. to 6 p.m. Monday through Friday. Patients can also download the mobile app, Mobile Rx, which will allow them to manage and fill their prescriptions online. In addition to Hartsville, CSC Community Pharmacy operates pharmacy locations in Bennettsville, Bishopville, Latta, McColl, Society Hill and Cheraw.

CareSouth Carolina installs GPS NPBI Technology to Purify Air in Several Locations



To help protect against the spread of COVID-19 in its offices, CareSouth Carolina has announced the installation of Global Plasma Solutions' Proprietary NPBI[™] Technology in many of its locations across its five-county service area.

These "air scrubbers," as they are referred to, have been installed at CareSouth Carolina's Hartsville Medical Center, Corporate offices, Call

center, Bishopville Medical Center, Bishopville Pediatric Dental office, the Rosa Lee Gerald Center in Society Hill, Special Programs administrative offices, Bennettsville Main Medical Center, all of its mobile units and the McColl Health & Wellness Center. "Having these air scrubbers installed at a time when the coronavirus seems to be surging in South Carolina is a significant addition to all of the safety measures taking place at CareSouth Carolina," CareSouth Carolina CEO Ann Lewis said. "Keeping our patients and staff safe is our major priority during this pandemic. This new equipment provides an added degree of security."

These air scrubbers showed a 99.4 percent reduction rate on a SARS-CoV-2 (COVID-19) surface strain within 30 minutes during ionization testing. This is the first instance in which an air purification company has effectively neutralized SARS-CoV-2. Following initial testing of coronavirus 229E in March 2020, Global Plasma Solutions utilized its proprietary needlepoint bipolar ionization to inactivate SARS-CoV-2. The study was jointly executed with Aviation Clean Air.

In this laboratory study, Aviation Clean Air designed a test to mimic ionization conditions like that of a commercial aircraft's fuselage. Based on viral titrations, it was determined that at 10 minutes, 84.2% of the virus was inactivated. At 15 minutes, 92.6% of the virus was inactivated, and at 30 minutes, 99.4% of the virus was inactivated.

"The testing results we achieved through our proprietary needlepoint bipolar ionization technology clearly demonstrate that Global Plasma Solutions is the gold standard in air purification," said Global Plasma Solutions Founder and Chief Technology Officer, Charles Waddell. "For any kind of facility from commercial buildings to aircrafts, delivering the cleanest, safest indoor air environment will only become increasingly more important, and our ozone-free technology is one of the most sophisticated products on the market."

Needlepoint bipolar ionization works to safely clean indoor air, leveraging an electronic charge to create a high concentration of positive and negative ions. These ions travel through the air continuously seeking out and attaching to particles. This sets in motion a continuous pattern of particle combination. As these particles become larger, they are eliminated from the air more rapidly.

Additionally, positive and negative ions have microbicidal effects on pathogens, ultimately reducing the infectivity of the virus. Global Plasma Solutions' needlepoint bipolar ionization is ozone-free and the only kind in its category to pass the RCTA DO-160 standard for aircraft. Traditional bipolarionization systems produce harmful ozone as a byproduct.



CareSouth Carolina has 5 Moby Units

Welcome to a Moby! The future of Health Care Technology

CareSouth Carolina unveiled its newest asset, a fleet of mobile sprinter vans equipped with state-of-the-art technology referred to as "Mobys."

The Moby, which is a mobile unit equipped with healthcare technology, allows CareSouth Carolina providers, nurses and community health workers to operate outside of the four walls of their office locations and help treat and care for patients in their own communities. CareSouth Carolina will have five total Moby units that can be used to provide and enhance COVID-19 testing and make services more accessible to the communities.

"We're going all around all of our counties and we're going to do testing," CareSouth Carolina CEO Ann Lewis. "Perhaps when COVID-19 begins to calm down, we know that many of you are not comfortable going into the office. We'll be able to go out in the community and provide screenings and medical services to the area, as well."

The MOBY vans were made possible from HRSA's National Cares Act Grant and are equipped with refrigerating technology, contactless temperature-taking applications, a window to make walk-up services convenient and much more.

"We have seen the data and we understand the significant need for testing in our community," Lewis said. "We're available and we're going to deploy these as we see the needs of the communities."

CareSouth Carolina has provided drive-thru testing events in Society Hill, Bennettsville, Bishopville, Darlington, Latta, Chesterfield, Cheraw, Lamar, Lake View, Blenheim, Timmonsville and many more. In addition to the drivethru testing events, CSC has also administered testing at its offices located throughout the Pee Dee.

Since March 12, CareSouth Carolina has administered more than 10,000 COVID-19 tests.

CareSouth Carolina, which serves more than 39,000 patients in five counties in the Pee Dee region, is working to provide access to testing and education for patients across its communities.
